Critical Gender Studies 2a "Introduction to Critical Gender Studies/ Social Movements"

This course will examine how social movements of the 20th and 21st centuries have promoted and contested ideas and institutions related to gender and sexuality. The questions we will pose include: What are social movements? How do movements mobilize, how do they define interests and frame issues, and what kinds of effects do they have on society? How do movements construct their identities and grapple with differences? Finally, how do social movements challenge the social organization of gender and sexuality? Our examples will include feminist and antifeminist movements; men's movements; movements of women of color; women's health movements; reproductive rights movements; lesbian and gay movements; AIDS activism; and movements for peace, social justice, and human rights. Our readings will address both theory and practice, and we will draw on a diverse and interdisciplinary body of literature and visual materials. By comparing and contrasting a wide range of movements, we hope to gain insight into how movements differ, and why some succeed while others fail. While focusing on the United States, the course will locate U.S. social movements in a global context.

In this course we will examine through three different policies how women's demands for equality in France have been interpreted by policymakers. The historic Ministry of Women's Rights (*Ministère des droits de la femme*); a recent parity law (concerning women's election to office); and a recent anti-veiling law (concerning young women in secular

schools) offer opportunities to examine feminists' demands as well as their (mis?)interpretations in law and policy.

Critical Gender Studies 104 "Advanced Topics in Comparative Perspectives/Mothers and Motherhood in America"

This course examines differing views of motherhood and maternal experiences from a transnational and historical perspective. We will explore cultural and political meanings attributed to motherhood, and the ways in which the maternal role informs women's personal and civic identities. In addition, we will also examine differing attitudes and practices toward the maternal body, and how new reproductive technologies have affected women in different parts of the world.

Critical Gender Studies 111 "Gender and the Body: The Archive of Anorexia"

This course explores the appearance of Anorexia in medical, aesthetic, and popular literatures from the late 19th century to the present. Tracing the clinical genealogy of the diagnoses of hysteria, hysterical anorexia, and anorexia nervosa, we will explore how those diagnostic categories coalesced during the first several decades of the 20th century. We then explore feminist and queer theoretical attempts to make sense of Anorexia in the context of patriarchal ideologies about the "proper" image and role of women's bodies. Finally, we interrogate visual culture in the late 20th and early 21st centuries to find out how the concept of Anorexia has expanded to include a variety of practices, and has affected an increasingly wide range of communities.
