

Undergraduate Courses

CGS 2A - Intro to CGS: Key Terms & Concepts

Lecturer, Critical Gender Studies Program

This course will be a general introduction to the key terms, issues, and concepts in the fields of gender and sexuality studies.

CGS 100A - Conceptualizing Gender: Theoretical Approaches

Lecturer, Critical Gender Studies Program

This course explores the significance of gender as a category of analysis by examining diverse theoretical frameworks from the field of critical gender studies. Particular attention is given to gender in relation to race, class, sexuality, nation, (dis)ability, and religion.

CGS 112 - Sexuality & Nation

Kirstie Dorr, Department of Ethnic Studies

(Cross-listed with ETHN 127.) This course explores the nexus of sex, race, ethnicity, gender, and nation and considers their influence on identity, sexuality, migration movement and borders, and other social, cultural, and political issues that these constructs affect.

CGS 114 - Gender, Race, Ethnicity, & Class

Lecturer, Critical Gender Studies Program

(Cross-listed with ETHN 183.) Gender is often neglected in studies of ethnic/racial politics. This course explores the relationship of race, ethnicity, class, and gender by examining the participation of working-class women of color in community politics and how they challenge mainstream political theory.

CGS 121 - Selected Topics in CGS: Sex Education & Policy

Lecturer, Critical Gender Studies Program

An interdisciplinary course focusing on one of a variety of topics in gender studies, such as gender and science, the body, reproductive technologies, and public policy. May be taken for credit three times when topics vary.

CGS 190 – CGS Honors Seminar

Sara Kaplan, Critical Gender Studies Program

Interdisciplinary readings in feminist theory and research methodology to prepare students for writing an honors thesis. Open to Critical Gender Studies majors who have been admitted to the Critical Gender Studies Honors Program.
