In this course, we consider several contemporary U.S. social movements -- contesting globalization, the rise of the prison industry, anti-immigrant nativism, and violence against women -- in relation to various histories of feminism: liberal feminism, feminist anti-lynching activism, women of color feminism, and women's movements within anticolonial struggles.



Critical Gender Studies 100 - Conceptualizing Gender: Theories and Methods

If, as feminist scholars have argued for decades, gender is not a 'natural' category, but a social construct, then how, precisely, is it constructed? This course offers a survey of how different scholars, writers, artists, and activists have sought to answer that question. Drawing upon historical and contemporary readings, film, and new media viewings, and current political and cultural events, we will explore both the key theoretical frameworks and various methodological approaches used in critical gender studies. We will challenge ourselves to complicate our understandings of seemingly natural concepts such as 'male/female,' 'man/woman,' and 'homosexual/heterosexual' as we experience them in our own daily lives and perceive them in the world around us. Our work will be carried out with a primary goal in mind: developing our own interdisciplinary critical apparatus through which we can better understand not only the conditions under which 'gender' is lived, but the terms through which the very concepts of sex, gender, and sexuality are produced, negotiated, and transformed.

Critical Gender Studies 113 - Gender and Sexuality in the Arts

The class "Gender and Sexuality in Art" introduces students to contemporary and post-contemporary artists and theorists whose art work emerges from considerations of gender and sexuality. Focusing on artwork from the 1960's to the present, the class looks at film, media and performance art in order to explore a number of trajectories in which gender and sexuality are central to the thinking of the work. Beginning with erotic film in the 60's, the class continues with a discussion of the shift from second to third wave feminism and the reclaiming of feminine sexuality that was part of that shift. Artists across multiple genres open a discussion on what may be considered queer art. Transversal lines of racial fetishization, sex work, affect and pornography will be discussed. The class concludes with more recent developments including cyberfeminism, transspecies and transreal mixed reality art practice.
