CGS 2A - Intro to CGS: Key Terms & Concepts

This course will be a general introduction to the key terms, issues, and concepts in the fields of gender and sexuality studies.

CGS 87 - Freshmen Seminar: Virtual Intimacies

How do digital technologies bring us closer to other people and drive us away from them? What happens when personal interactions once conducted face-to-face are carried out over email, text message, Skype, and Facebook? What consequences arise when our physical relationships become virtual? This course explores the role of digital media in intimate relationships through such case studies as online friendships, Tinder and Grindr, transnational surrogacy, and helicopter parenting.

CGS 87 – Freshmen Seminar: Gender & Sexuality in Pop Culture – Sex on Screen

We will talk about how sexuality is constructed in television, film, and advertising. Students will have opportunities to propose shows or films for discussion.

CGS 100A - Conceptualizing Gender: Theoretical Approaches

This course explores the significance of gender as a category of analysis by examining diverse theoretical frameworks from the field of critical gender studies. Particular attention is given to gender in relation to race, class, sexuality, nation, (dis)ability, and religion.

CGS 111 - Gender & the Body

Various approaches to the study of gendered bodies. Possible topics to include masculinities/femininities; lifecycles; biology, culture, and identity; medical discourses; and health issues.

CGS 122 - Advanced Topics in Comparative Perspectives: Lady Avengers in Asian Cinema

Though action cinema tends to be thought of as an overwhelmingly masculine genre, this course takes up the figure of the "lady avenger," who shares a special association with Asian cinema. By pairing key films from across Asian cinema with feminist theory, this course investigates the stakes of these films' fantasies. We'll look to the sister of the femme fatale, the final girl, the bad girl, the violent girl, and the mean girl to question whether girls with guns—or more often in these films, swords—are feminists, asking: what can cinema avenge and for whom?



CGS 190 - CGS Honors Seminar

Interdisciplinary readings in feminist theory and research methodology to prepare students for writing an honors thesis. Open to Critical Gender Studies majors who have been admitted to the Critical Gender Studies Honors Program.
